Firecracker Christians

It's that time of year when the summer heat will increase and eventually we'll long for cooler evenings. As the sweat rolls down your checks and you prepare for yet another Fourth of July Picnic, I call on you to consider the firecracker.

Before I discuss firecrackers, I want to confess a frustration I have had since my childhood days. You see, when my family would return from the fireworks stand with our fireworks and sparklers, my mother wouldn't allow me or my brother to pop one firecracker or one single skyrocket. My father did those things. All we were allowed to do was wave sparklers in the night sky. Eventually, I did come up with my own idea as to how to improve the use of the sparklers (more on that in a moment). Thus, for me there are no fond memories of lighting the fuse and running as fast as I could from the impending blast. On the positive side however, I still have all of my fingers. Back to the new and improved sparkler. One Fourth of July evening I duct taped a sparkler to my arrow and shot it high into the starlit sky. Finally I found a way to send my own firework into the air! My Father was impressed and that started a new 4th of July tradition that took place up until I left the nest. I've never seen anyone else use a sparkler in that manner and do not recommend anyone trying it.

Wikipedia defines firecrackers as follows: "Firecrackers are generally made of cardboard or plastic, with flash powder or black powder as the propellant. This is not always the case, however. Anything from match heads to lighter fluid have been used successfully in making firecrackers. The key to loud firecrackers, however, although in part lying in the propellant substance, is pressure. The entire firecracker must be very tightly packed in order for it to work best. Flash powder does not need to be packed tightly, however."

There is, I think, an analogy for Christians in their walk of discipleship: Are we like firecrackers?

For a firecracker to work properly, it must be packed tightly so that enough pressure can be built up to make a loud bang. This raises a question for all of us. Are we packed tightly with the Holy Spirit so that we are ready to burst with the loud bang of enthusiasm for the Lord? Remember when you or some friends would light the fuse of a firecracker and then toss it away but nothing happened? That was a disappointing experience. To ensure that the same thing does not happen in our churches, we need to open ourselves to be filled completely by the Holy Spirit so that something will happen when the fuse is lit.

2018 Recipient of the Gordon Anderson "Man In the Back" Award

Clayton Hanson, along with three other cadets traveled to Hanoi, Vietnam, for a three-week cultural immersion The group spent all three weeks in and around Hanoi. During this time the cadets completed three volunteer projects. First, they spent several days with students at the Hanoi College of Technology and Trading, where they provided the Vietnamese students with classes on both English and self defense. Second, the cadets worked in the small rural village of Mai Chau, 160 km from Hanoi, where they harvested rice and assisted a local factory staffed solely by physically-disabled women of several ethnic minorities. Finally they spent several days at the Vinh Ngoc kindergarten. In addition to these volunteer projects, the cadets had the opportunity to visit a variety of important cultural and historical sites around Hanoi.


