Easter weekend discussions tend to skip Saturday. We focus on Friday and Sunday. The crucifixion and resurrection command our thoughts. But we tend to ignore Saturday because nothing happened right? Far from it in fact the experiences of Jesus' followers on that Saturday can help us to understand how to live when life knocks us down.

Looking back over the past several weeks I would never have imagined experiencing everything that I have. Being asked to quarantine away from everyone to help fight a deadly enemy that you can't see but know that it's out there. When you must leave the house, taking time to consider where you will go and what precautions you will take. We can think about how life was and for the most part how it will be again but it's the unknown, the lack of control that causes stress. I wonder what the mood was like. Were they angry, confused, guilty, scared or a combination of some or all of these? They witnessed their Master crucified and buried behind a stone. Could they be next? What would they do going forward? I would say the mood in that room was rather dark.

That Saturday was the time between the struggle and the solution; the question and the answer; the offered prayer and the answer. Saturday's silence torments us. Is God angry? Did I disappoint him? Or, maybe in your case God knows your struggling in your career, your finances are a mess, your marriage is failing, your health is declining. Why doesn't He act? What are you supposed to do until He does? What if the answer isn't what you wanted? Do you have times when you feel angry, confused, guilty or scared?

I'm reminded of a saying "It's Always Darkest Before the Dawn." It will never be any darker than it was the day Jesus died. All of hell was rejoicing that the Savior had lost. Then came the dawn. It didn't come in as a gradual lightening but one glorious flash of light as the stone was rolled away and Jesus was gone. The light at the end of the tunnel is the empty tomb. The stone wasn't rolled away to allow Jesus to leave but for us to see in and know that He had risen.

Jesus has promised all of us that same light if we simply believe in Him. During those times when you feel your life is out of control, turn over control to Jesus. Remember, no matter what happens to us in this life, as Christians we have been promised an eternity with our Lord.
